Sydney B.

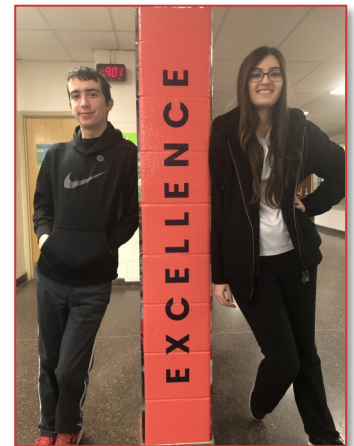

ENGLISH & LITERACY

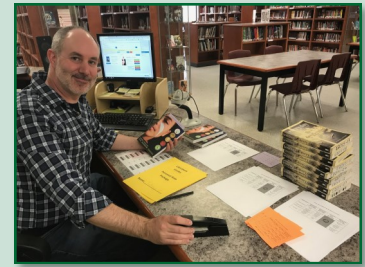
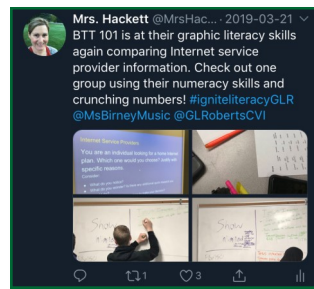
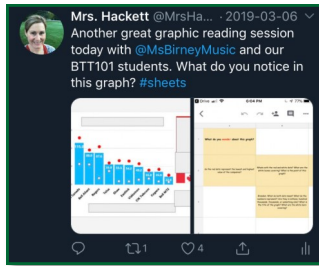
O.S.S.L.T.

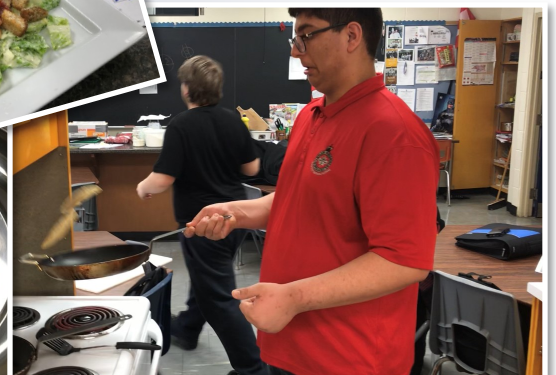


LITERATURE CIRCLES

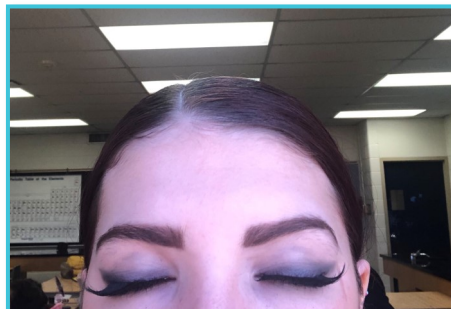
ELECTIONS CANADA VISIT TO CIVICS CLASS

The lessons that we have learnt over our two competitions were not only memorable but are crucial to the enhancement of our problem-solving skills.

OUR COMPETITIONS



As a rookie team we were very excited to finally compete in a competition. But with excitement, comes anxiety and fear of failure. Our first competition was at UOIT. The weekend of March 1st-3rd was crazy, and there were many teams, some teams that have

been doing these competitions for years and many other rookie teams. The first issue that we as a team faced was, that a crucial mechanism was too heavy. This was a major problem, so we started to drill out holes to take off some of the weight. As we activated the elevator during one of our qualifying matches the weak aluminum bent and disabled the entire elevator. Due to quick thinking, our mentors, and a lot of perseverance, we concluded that it would be best if we competed without key components working. Our heavy arm become more of an advantage than a problem, as the Drive team shifted their focus to defence. Our Robot was able to successfully defend the other robots on our team. At the end of the day, our team's hard work on the robot lead us to receive the "Rookie Inspiration" award. This was a very motivating and inspirational moment for us. The award has encouraged numerous students in our school to join FIRST Robotics and brings lots of attention to GL. Roberts.

Our second competition was at McMaster University, in Hamilton. This was our second tournament we attended for FIRST Robotics, and it was awesome. We all had to meet at our school at 5:30 in the morning so we can arrive on time at McMaster. As soon as we arrived, we unpacked our stuff and got ready to attach the newly built elevator and

intake onto our robot. On our practice round the drive team was able to successfully complete one of the essential skills needed for that tournament (inserting a hatch panel – as seen in the picture). We didn't make the playoffs, but we had so much fun – "the hardest fun we have ever had"!



NEXT STEPS

In the future our team is hoping to compete again next year. The biggest challenge we are facing is losing majority of members due to graduation and the need of attracting new members as well as funding. As most of our Build, Drive, and Finance team is in their last year of highschool, there will be a struggle trying to replace such valuable team players. Without them having a team will be a challenge. Cassandra Schmidt tells us that "I can't believe high-school is almost over, I guess time flies when you're having fun with your friends and robotics".

CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION



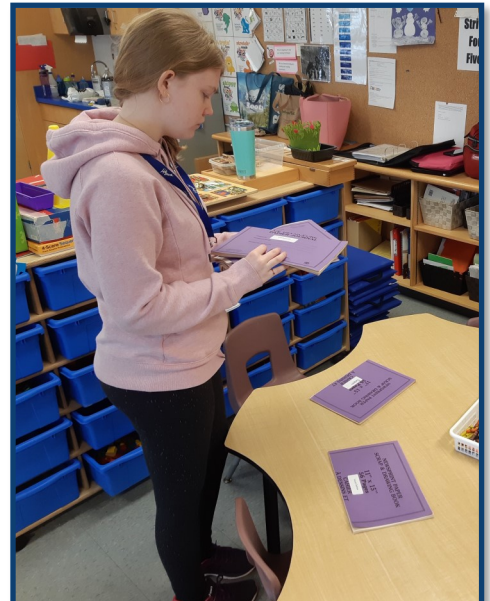
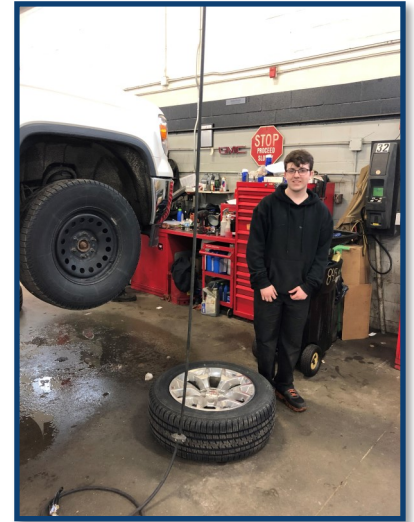

FINANCING YOUR POST SECONDARY EDUCATION

An OSAP presentation was held on February 20th during period 3. Students received information from a Trent University representative regarding the OSAP application process. GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

COMMENCEMENT

On Thursday April 11th, grade 12s were invited to attend a grad assembly to learn about graduation ceremony requirements. Each student who attended the assembly was informed that their graduation package are available online for completion. This package included a questionnaire, grad gown information, invitation and scholarship/awards/bursary information. Please note that the \$20.00 for gown rental and the 1 page application(s) for scholarships/bursaries/awards is due to the Guidance Office by Tuesday May 23rd. Please contact the guidance office at 905-728-7594 if you have any questions.

Commencement for our graduating students will be held on Thursday, June 27th at 1:00 p.m. A list of Potential Graduates will be posted just outside of the Guidance Office and all graduating students must check to ensure that their name is on this list. **Students who have not yet completed their 40 hours of community involvement but hope to graduate this June must consider this a top priority.** The deadline for submission of Community Hours to be eligible to graduate this year is **Thursday, May 23rd, 2019**. The activity must fall within the guiding principles the Board has established and should be identified on the Board's list of examples. A list of Eligible Activities is on the Mandatory Community Involvement Activity Record Card which can be picked up in Guidance. If you are unsure whether your activity will qualify, please speak to Guidance for approval. Students can also find potential volunteer opportunities posted in the Guidance Office.

2018-2019 COURSE SELECTION AND TIMETABLING PROCESS

Student course selections were completed in February using Career Cruising. Students should have brought home a copy of their on-line course selections to get signed by a parent or guardian and then return the signed copy back to the guidance office. We are in the initial stages of developing a timetable for the 2019-2020 school year. If your child requires any changes to their course selections for next year please, have them come to guidance to see a counsellor.

SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Registration for summer school courses and programs will begin May 1st. If your child is interested in taking a summer school course, they will need to come to the guidance office to discuss course options.

Other summer school programs being offered at G.L. Roberts are as follows:

Credit Recovery Program – we will also be offering a two-week credit recovery programming for G.L. Roberts students during the first two weeks of July. Students interested in this credit recovery program should see a guidance counsellor for eligibility. The fee is \$15.00 for this program.

S.M.I.L.E. – we will be offering an introduction to Coding Class for students interested in computer coding. Coding is a necessary skill for the growing industry of computer technology.
