

VISITING CAMPUSES

University and College Applications

College students are encouraged to go to www.ontariocolleges.ca to begin their online application. The deadline for equal consideration for college programs is **February 1st**, **2021.** It is highly recommended that students complete their college application with their payment well before the **February 1st**, **2021** deadline.



Application Deadline for Ontario Universities



Students interested in pursuing University need to be aware that, in November, students will receive their individual OUAC pin numbers, which allows them to proceed to www.ouac.ca to begin their online application. Application deadline for Ontario Universities is **Friday January 15th**. Once again, it is highly recommended that stu-

dents complete their university application with their payment well before the January 15, 2021 deadline.

SHSM Environmental Studies Program

G.L. Roberts runs a Specialized High Skills Major (SHSM) program in Environmental Studies. This program allows students to focus their high school grade 11 and 12 studies within an environmental perspective.

Courses within this program include science. horticulture, geography, technology, co-operative education & more. 'Reach Ahead' activities include job shadowing, college & university connections, field trips, guest speakers, & community events. Certifications include first aid, CPR, WHMIS, & industry-recognized trade skills.

Even with all the Covid protocols, we are still running our SHSM!

GREENHOUSE NEWS

Well, 2020 has sure been a challenge to us all! One major success story is our greenhouse at GL! We saved the plant collections, and while the normal plant sales were cancelled with the Covid restrictions, life goes and grows on!

This fall the horticulture students have been busy saving and planting seeds, taking clones, repotting plants, and diagnosing plant problems. It has been an excellent quadmester with motivated hardworking students! We also have added to our collection of succulents at GL Roberts! We purchased new varieties of aloe, gasteria, haworthia, crassula, and echeveria.

The fall hybridization experiments on our collection of geraniums (really perlargoniums) is also underway, with dozens of promising crosses setting seed. We have the largest collection in Canada, with over 500 varieties. Truly a beautifully diverse collection!

with students and staff in honour of Thanksgiving.


