




SHSM Manufacturing


Autocratic Leadership is a management style wherein one person controls all the decisions and takes very little input from group members.






Girls Night










GRADE 12 COMMENCEMENT

Ministry of Education Graduation Requirements:

Community Involvement Hours

This is a friendly reminder that students must have a minimum of 40 Community Involvement hours completed before the end of Grade 12. That breaks down to 10 hours per

eLearning Requirements

The Ministry of Education has also implemented a requirement for students to earn 2 eLearning credits to earn their Ontario Secondary Diploma (OSSD). However, parents/guardians are able to complete a form and opt-out of this requirement. Please complete this form and submit it to the Guidance Department, if you would like your child to be exempted from this requirement. Submitting the Opt-Out form to Guidance will remove the graduation requirement for your student, but your student will still have the choice to take eLearning courses, if they choose to do so.





CHROMEBOOK SUPPORT MESSAGES

Students learning *in-person* should report any Chromebook or other device damage to their teacher.
