TASTE OF THE TRADES






Just a few short weeks ago, G. L. Roberts had the pleasure of running the second annual Taste of the Trades program. This three-day summer camp program allowed 24 students from Grades 7 and 8 to come

to the high school and get hands-on experience in our school's shops and culinary labs, all at no cost to the student.

Students had the opportunity to build in the woodshop, work with metal in the manufacturing shop, design and print on a CNC router, and experience the atmosphere of the automotive lab, as well as discover automotive principles as they made electric cars.



Each day, students prepared their own lunches as they were hands-on in the kitchen, cooking pizza, tacos, and casseroles, not to mention some tasty treats of brownies, cinnamon rolls, and cookies. Students were introduced to the many pathways they could take to work in trades including the exciting 'tech' courses that are available at G.L. Roberts. 


Ignite Durham Learning Foundation

ORANGE SHIRT DAY



Since 2013, Orange Shirt Day has been recognized as a day for schools and communities to commemorate Residential School Survivors and learn about the legacy of the residential school system. Orange Shirt Day is an opportunity for schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation to commemorate and recognize Residential School Survivors. Phyllis (Jack) Webstad's story recalls her 1973 placement in a residential school. Her grandmother had purchased a new orange shirt for Phyllis to wear her first day at the Mission school. Sadly, when Phyllis got to the Mission, her clothes were taken and she never saw the orange shirt again. Phyllis felt like her feelings didn't matter and that no one cared. She has been on a healing journey since childhood and tells her story so that others might benefit and understand.

Orange Shirt Day and National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

September 30 has been recognized by the federal government as the annual National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. It is important to recognize and understand the lasting impacts and current realities that continue to impact indigenous students and families. Every one of us has a responsibility to reflect upon our role in reconciliation with Indigenous peoples by educating ourselves on Indigenous history, the legacy of systemic discrimination, the residential school systems, and the ongoing impacts. To mark this day, we have compiled a collection of resources to encourage individual and collective learning, reflection, and action regarding the legacy of the residential school system and the ongoing impacts of colonization. pella (without music) and two accompanied songs called Who Has Seen the Wind? And Time Warp.


The music groups finished off the day with a Hallowe'en social to celebrate another successful performance.

Community Involvement Hours

The Guidance department has organized several opportunities already throughout the school year for students to earn some community involvement hours. As a reminder, all students must earn at least 40 hours of service, as part of the requirement to earn their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). Students are able to begin earning their hours the summer before Grade 9 starts. Additionally, students are recommended to set

Online Learning Graduation Requirements

Students are required to earn two online learning credits to graduate from secondary school with an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, beginning with every student who entered Grade 9 in the 2020-2021 school year. Parents/guardians may choose to opt their child out of the mandatory online courses required for graduation. 

BUSSING UPDATE

Secondary School Bus Cancellations

With colder temperatures approaching, we are sharing information on how the DDSB is handling the cancellation of buses due to winter weather in order to ensure everyone remains safe.



In the event that transportation services are cancelled due to inclement weather, secondary schools located within the affected cancellation zone(s) will switch to a virtual learning day for all students. **All secondary students will be required to stay at home.** Students will be taught virtually in RealTime by their teacher with the exception of the "Study Hall" period where students will be supported through FlexTime (asynchronous) learning. If any students arrive at school, we will ensure that they can return home safely.

How will I be notified if transportation services are cancelled and/or schools are closed? Families will be notified as soon as possible (no later than 7:00am) through a posting on the DDSB website, social media and where possible, through local radio stations.

What zone am I in? Students at GL Roberts are in Zone 4.

CHROMEBOOK SUPPORT MESSAGES

Students learning in-person should report any Chromebook or other device damage to their teacher. From there, the teacher will generate a help ticket and direct the student to the main office for the LAN Technician to assess the device and plan a repair/replacement strategy. The LAN Tech is available to support students from 9am to 1pm in Tech HUB Tuesdays, Thursdays and alternate Fridays. While student de-



vices are being fixed, they may borrow a temporary replacement for use while in the school from the Library. Intentional damage to DDSB assigned devices may result in an invoice which will require repayment. Parents of students enrolled in **DDSB@Home** in Grade K-6, please note that a DDSB device is not required as any web-enabled device can be used to access DDSB@Home lessons and resources.

DDSB@Home students and parents can access troubleshooting tips by visiting DDSB@Home Elementary or DDSB@Home Secondary websites. If the problem persists, students should report their device to their teacher. From there, schools will submit an IT Incident as per the standard process. The family will be contacted via email to book an appointment for a curb-side swap at the Education Centre.
