

## First Nations, Metis, Inuit Voice



We were honoured to have Tammy and Bernard Nelson of “Teach for Canada” visit with us November 28th. They shared traditional knowledge of medicines and the drum. Bernard is a long time Men’s Traditional Dancer and Sun-dancer, and a member of the Eabametoong First Nation. He is Wolf Clan and his ancestry is Cree and Ojibwe. Bernard is a survivor

of the Pelican Lake Indian Residential School and is currently an Elder at the Royal Military College in the Aboriginal Leadership Opportunity Year program. He works with First Nations, Metis and Inuit students throughout Canada.

Tammy Nelson is a long time Women’s Traditional Dancer. She is Ojibwee from N’bissing First Nation, married to Bernard, and into Wolf Clan.

Together, Bernard and Tammy follow the Seven Grandfather Teachings, **Love, Respect, Bravery, Truth, Honesty, Humility, and Wisdom**. They provide cultural awareness, bedding, crafts, singing, and drumming to various school boards.

Bernard and Tammy were awarded the Queen’s Diamond Jubilee Medal for their inspirational leadership and community service.

We are so thankful for the time they spent with us.

## WHAT'S NEW

### Grade 8 to 9 Transition Recap

The GLR Guidance department has been working hard to ensure our future Lakers are ready to begin grade 9 in September. We have visited each of our elementary schools, hosted a family information night, and have hosted students and their teachers from all of our elementary schools for tours and presentations of GL as well. The current grade 8s are both excited and nervous to begin high school in September!



### Community Involvement Hours

The Guidance department has organized several opportunities already throughout the school year for students to earn some community involvement hours. As a reminder, all students must earn at least 40 hours of service, as part of the requirement to earn their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). Students are able to begin earning their hours the summer before Grade 9 starts. Additionally, students are recommended to set realistic goals for themselves by earning 10 hours per year, to achieve the goal of 40 hours, before the end of Grade 12. **If you are in grade 12, ensure you complete your hours as soon as possible!** Do not leave these to the last minute. ### Online Learning Graduation Requirements

A friendly reminder that students are required to earn two online learning credits to graduate from secondary school with an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, beginning with every student who entered Grade 9 in the 2020-2021 school year. Parents/guardians may choose to opt their child out of the mandatory online courses required for graduation. If you would like to opt-out your child from the mandatory online learning you will need to complete and submit an opt out form to the Guidance Office. Opt Out Forms are available in the Guidance office.

## Post-Secondary Applications








# Art Matters

## BUSSING UPDATE



### Secondary School Bus Cancellations

With colder temperatures approaching, we are sharing information on how the DDSB is handling the cancellation of buses due to winter weather in order to ensure everyone remains safe.

In the event that transportation services are cancelled due to inclement weather, secondary schools located within the affected cancellation zone(s) will switch to a virtual learning day for all students. **All secondary students will be required to stay at home.** Students will be taught virtually in RealTime by their teacher with the exception of the “Study Hall” period where students will be supported through FlexTime (asynchronous) learning. If any students arrive at school, we will ensure that they can return home safely.

How will I be notified if transportation services are cancelled and/or schools are closed?

Families will be notified as soon as possible (no later than 7:00am) through a posting on the DDSB website, social media and where possible, through local radio stations.

What zone am I in?

**Students at GL Roberts are in Zone 4.**

# CHROMEBOOK SUPPORT MESSAGES



Students learning *in-person* should report any Chromebook or other device damage to their teacher. From there, the teacher will generate a help ticket and direct the student to the main office for the LAN Technician to assess the device and plan a repair/replacement strategy. The LAN Tech is available to support students from **9am to 1pm in Tech HUB Tuesdays, Thursdays and alternate Fridays**. While student devices are being fixed, they may borrow a temporary replacement for use while in the school from the Library. Intentional damage to DDSB assigned devices may result in an invoice which will require repayment. Parents of students enrolled in **DDSB@Home** in Grade K-6, please note that a DDSB device is not required as any web-enabled device can be used to access DDSB@Home lessons and resources. DDSB@Home students and parents can access troubleshooting tips by visiting DDSB@Home Elementary or DDSB@Home Secondary websites. If the problem persists, students should report their device to their teacher. From there, schools will submit an IT Incident as per the standard process. The family will be contacted via email to book an appointment for a curbside swap at the Education Centre.
