The Opportunity

The theme of this year's gallery is **Cultivating a Connected Community**. (further information available via **Student.art@ddsb.ca**)

Students in Grades 7—12 are encouraged to use their creativity to showcase their own unique perspectives about connection and community.

Timelines

Digital representations of completed (or nearly completed) artworks should be submitted by April 6, 2023.

Selections will be made by the committee in May, 2023.

Successful artists will be contacted in May, and arrangements will be made for completed artwork drop-off at the Education Centre (400 Taunton Road East Whitby).

The Gallery opening will take place June 8, 2023.

A digital gallery hosted on the DDSB website will allow equitable access to these artworks. These artworks will be available after the exhibition opens.

Artworks will be on display for approximately 11 months, with an opportunity for the artist to retrieve their artwork following the display period. Artwork unclaimed by the artist will be displayed and/or stored elsewhere within the DDSB system for a period of two (2) years.

Selection Committee

The Selection Committee will receive digital copies of artwork and any accompanying stories that the artist would like to submit for consideration and will deliberate to select the artworks to be displayed.

Cultivating a Connected Community—Creative Brief

Artworks should incorporate the theme of **Cultivating a Connected Community**, focusing on student aspirations or inspiration regarding connection, communities, human rights, equity, and belonging—issues, goals, identities, etc. Artists are encouraged to think about this from a lens that includes DDSB values around human rights, equity, inclusion, diversity.

Artists should consider the following questions:

What does the work community mean to you?

What communities do you belong to?

What communities make up the DDSB?

How can we cultivate or nurture a community?

What would you like to say about human rights, equity, belonging and/or connection?

Artworks need to be designed for display on a hanging track—maximum weight of 4kg; they will have eyehooks and hanger wire pre-installed by the artist.

Medium for artworks is at the artist's discretion (pastel, charcoal, pencil, pen and ink, watercolour, acrylic, oil, photograph, mixed media, digital design, 3D art, printmaking, other)

Artworks composed of dry media (ie. Charcoal, chalk pastel, pencil) will be framed behind glass or sprayed with a fixative.

Maximum size of the framed artwork 18" by 24" and may be presented in landscape or portrait orientation.


MELLY'S CAFE AND MARKET

CAREER PATH





COMM TECH

TGJ3M is an outstanding course that offers students a comprehensive and hands-on introduction to the world of communications technology in the media. The course is designed to provide students with a broad understanding of the various





forms of media, including live, recorded, and graphic communications. Students will have the

opportunity to develop their skills in areas such as print and graphic communications, video



production, photography, digital imaging, and to be hands-on with DSLR cameras, lighting, and video recording equipment. Accompanying the hardware, students will be learning to use a handful of Adobe software

such as Photoshop, Illustrator, and Premiere Pro, just to name a few. Here the students are using lighting and a smartphone camera gimbal to video record scenes for their trailer of a movie.

COMPUTER SCIENCE



ICS2O is an engaging introductory course that offers students a deeper understanding of computer hardware and software with an opportunity to be hands on with Ruby programming language. The course is designed to help students develop the necessary skills to write and test computer programs by various problem-solving strate-

gies. Students will learn about the fundamentals of the hardware internals of a computer, a vast collection of software programs available, and even to write



their own small interactive programs. As well, students will explore important topics such as environmental issues, safe computing practices, and emerging technologies. In these photos students are working on their programming assignment, purposely trying to show the practicality of programming.







Online Learning Gradation Requirement Opt-Out Form

Students are required to earn two online learning credits to graduate from secondary school, beginning with every student who entered Grade 9 in the 2020-21 school year.

Meeting the online learning graduation requirement should not pose a barrier to graduation for students. As with all learning, students taking online courses will have access to the supports

they need through their school, (e.g., guidance, nutrition programs, extra-curricular activities and services for English-language learners). If a student in a publicly funded school has an Individual Education Plan, the plan should be shared, when appropriate, with an educator instructing an online course delivered by another publicly funded school board, with the necessary consent.

Parents/guardians may choose to opt their child out of the mandatory online courses required for graduation. Students age 18 years of age or older or students who are 16 or 17 years of age and have withdrawn from parental control can also opt out of the graduation requirement. School boards must also allow for students and parents/guardians to opt back into the online learning graduation requirement should their decision change.

The Ministry of Education is providing increased flexibility in how Secondary Students can earn their Community Involvement Hours. Any student aged 14 years and older can count up to a maximum of 10 hours from paid employment toward their earned hours at the discretion of the Principal. Students counting



paid employment towards their graduation requirement are required to complete a reflection exercise indicating how their work contributed to the service for others.

The Guidance team held grade assemblies during the month of February to discuss course offerings and to review how to select courses for next year. During the month of February, students were independently re-



viewing their course selections for the upcoming school year. Once again, students should have chosen courses on-line, using myBlueprint.com as of March 2. We ask that the parents/guardians discuss the choices with their children to ensure that they've made the best choices possible. Reviewing your student's progress on myBlueprint can help students make decisions on course choices and pathway plans that best support their success. If

Community Involvement Hours

There have been numerous opportunities this year for our students to earn their Community Involvement hours. We encourage our students to continue seeking opportunities to earn their hours, and remind students and their families that students should earn a minimum of 10 hours each year, so that by the end of grade 12, they will have earned the minimum requirement of 40 hours. Students graduating in June 2023, are required to have a total of 40 hours.

ICON allows you to report and view your child's immunizations online any time. To report online, you will need the student's health card.

BUSSING UPDATE

Secondary School Bus Cancellations

With colder temperatures approaching, we are sharing information on how the DDSB is handling the cancellation of buses due to winter weather in order to ensure everyone remains safe.



In the event that transportation services are cancelled due to inclement weather, secondary schools located within the affected cancellation zone(s) will switch to a virtual learning day for all students. All secondary students will be required to stay at home. Students will be taught virtually in RealTime by their teacher with the exception of the "Study Hall" period where students will be supported through FlexTime (asynchronous) learning. If any students arrive at school, we will ensure that they can return home safely.

How will I be notified if transportation services are cancelled and/or schools are closed? Families will be notified as soon as possible (no later than 7:00am) through a posting on the DDSB website, social media and where possible, through local radio stations.

What zone am I in?
Students at GL Roberts are in Zone 4.

CHROMEBOOK SUPPORT MESSAGES

Students learning *in-person* should report any Chromebook or other device damage to their teacher. From there, the teacher should generate a help ticket and direct the student to the main office for the LAN Technician to assess the device and plan a repair/replacement strategy. The LAN Tech is available to support students from **9am**



to 1pm in Tech HUB Tuesdays, Thursdays and alternate Fridays. While student devices are being fixed, they may borrow a temporary replacement for use while in the school from the Library. Intentional damage to DDSB assigned devices may result in an invoice which will require repayment.

Parents of students enrolled in **DDSB@Home** in Grade K-6, please note that a DDSB device is not required as any web-enabled device can be used to access DDSB@Home lessons and resources.

DDSB@Home students and parents can access troubleshooting tips by visiting DDSB@Home Elementary or DDSB@Home Secondary websites. If the problem persists, students should report their device to their teacher. From there, schools will submit an IT Incident as per the standard process. The family will be contacted via email to book an appointment for a curb-side swap at the Education Centre.
